





### Positivity about devolution outweighs negativity by around 2:1




negative. Answer on a scale of 0-10 where 0 is very negative and 10 very positive


Q: Looking at the same list of issues, which parliament do you think *should* have the powers over each?

## Most believe **Scottish Parliament** WILL have more power in the next 10 years...



Devolution should be reversed and the Scottish Parliament should not exist 20%

Scotland should be fully independent 38%

> Devolution should still be in place with the same powers for the Scottish Parliament 20%

**Devolution should still** be in place with more powers for the Scottish Parliament 22%
